

- Evaluation of plans A, B, and C... and eventually option E :)










Other Examples of Inclusive Spaces

- Which activities require privacy
 - Headscarves
 - Makeup
 - Health issues
- Spaces that are welcoming & safe
 - Natural light
 - Transparency
 - Location
- How a space makes someone feel about their self image
 - Gender identity
 - Social pressure
 - Ability



Human-centered design means going above and beyond the current minimum requirements in adapting the space to meet people's real needs.
